

Texas Partnerships and A-F Ratings

All Partnerships

Performance contract must include annual performance targets related to the campus' overall rating

Turnaround Partnerships

The commissioner may not apply a sanction to the campus based on its accountability rating for the first two years of operation



2020: Not Rated-Declared State of Disaster

What

All campuses in the state of Texas will receive a 2020 rating of Not Rated: Declared State of Disaster

Why

School closures during the testing window inhibited the ability of the state to accurately measure district and campus performance



Underlying Assumptions for this Webinar

- Ultimate goal is to provide a great education for kids in a safe and healthy environment
- This webinar covers how the 2020 Not Rated rating impacts partnerships; doesn't address future years







To be eligible for Texas Partnership benefits, performance contracts must include academic performance targets*:

A	oproved before March 31, 2020	Approved after March 31, 2020
•	annual target for the overall campus academic rating a target for student growth based on the School Progress	 annual target for the overall campus academic rating

What's the impact? Benefits Eligibility

Benefits eligibility remains the same.

- The performance contract is still required to have annual performance targets based on campus rating
- Districts and operating partners are not required to amend performance contracts to maintain eligibility for benefits



TEM What's the impact? Renewal Decisions

Performance targets are used to make renewal decisions. Now there is a gap in the data a district uses to make that decision.

A gap in data; NOT an unmet goal!



Renewal Decisions: an example

Question to consider: how will a district (the authorizer) make a renewal decision for this contract?

The process for contract renewal is included in the performance contract and your district board policy.



TEM What are some steps we can take?

If the performance contract does not outline performance targets beyond the overall rating, here are some actions districts can consider (based on national best practice authorizing guidance):

Renewal Timeline	Next 12-18 months	More than 18 months		
Possible steps	 Extend the term of the contract by an additional year to have the full information needed to make the renewal decision. 	 Amend the contract to define the other sources of academic data that will be used starting in 2020-2021 as part of the evidence base for renewal decisions. 		
Keep in mind: this is not a best practice in a non-disaster situation!		Keep in mind: the operating partner must maintain sole authority to select and determine the use of any and all assessments to be used on the campus that are not

Key Takeaways and Questions

- ✓ Not Rated means the result for the annual target is missing
- ✓ Benefits eligibility does not change as long as targets meet requirements in rule
- ✓ The contract/district board policy has the process for renewal
- ✓ Districts should consider what information they need to make quality authorizing decisions







If a campus received unacceptable rating for the school year before operation of the district campus under a contract began, then the commissioner may not impose a sanction or take action against the campus.

The commissioner may not:

- Order the development of a turnaround plan
- Close the campus
- Install a Board of Managers

Regardless of the rating applied by TEA, the accountability sanction pause applies for the first two school years of operation under the contract.

(f) This subsection applies only to a district campus subject to a contract described by Subsection (a) that received an overall performance rating of unacceptable under Subchapter C, Chapter 39, for the school year before operation of the district campus under the contract began. The commissioner may not impose a sanction or take action against the campus under Section 39.107(a) or (e) for failure to satisfy academic performance standards during the first two school years of operation of a district campus under Subsection (a). The overall performance rating received by the campus during those first two school years is not included in calculating consecutive school years and is not considered a break in consecutive school years under Section 39.107(a) or (e).



What's the Impact?

Important to keep in mind:

- The 2020 Not Rated: Declared State of Disaster rating does not break the chain of consecutive years of unacceptable ratings for purposes of accountability interventions and sanctions.
- When a campus receives a rating of Not Rated: Declared State of Disaster, the campus shall continue to implement the previously ordered sanctions and interventions.
- The length of the contract is defined in the contract; the accountability pause duration does not change the term

If the 2021 Rating is an F:

- Campus A and B will be subject to closure/BoM.
- Campus C and D will continue interventions.
- Campus E will be ordered to develop a turnaround plan.

If the 2022 Rating is an F:

- Campus B will be subject to closure/BoM. (Campus A will be subject to closure/BoM with '21 rating.)
- Campus C and D will continue interventions.
- Campus E will be ordered to develop a turnaround plan.

Reminder: Pause based on years of operation

Campuses that have received a D or higher have "broken the chain" and are not included on this list.



What are some steps we can take?

Keep in mind the roles in autonomy and accountability:

- Operating partner makes and implements the plan
- The district is the authorizer:
 - Ensures the OP has a strong plan and is successfully implementing it
 - Requires OP action if goals are not being met (but OP decides on the actions)
